Window Restoration Update

Help Maintain a Piece of History

A passage from Matthew says that with God, nothing is impossible. **The Bloomville United Methodist Church** is seeing firsthand that having faith in God and our generous neighbors can help make the impossible happen as we continue a huge project in restoring the sanctuary's historic stained-glass windows. All four sides of the building feature several historic windows with intricate designs and vibrant colors, but the stained glass is in desperate need of repair and protection.



These beautiful windows are not only an irreplaceable part of the history of our church and our community and deserve to be saved, but repairs and restoration are necessary to help improve energy efficiency and structural safety. This work requires us to hire a specialized contractor and the work exceeds several thousand dollars per window.

Thanks to the strong support of our volunteers, members, and friends, the great work of our Board of Trustees, and generous grant support, the important repairs have been made to three of the six large windows. However, we still need help and you can play a role in preserving the beauty and wellbeing of the church for generations to come.

April is coming!

April is the cruelest month, breeding Lilacs out of the dead land, mixing Memory and desire, stirring Dull roots with spring rain Winter kept us warm, covering Earth in forgetful snow, feeding A little life with dried tubers.

"April is the cruelest month." This is the very first line of T.S. Eliot's longest poem, "The Wasteland" written in 1921-22. Why did T.S. Eliot give this title, The Waste Land to this poem? This is truly a significant question for us to grab Eliot's poetic imagination that he intended to breathe into this poem. It is crystal-clear for him to describe the then devastated bloody world as the wasteland full of spiritual barrenness, emptiness and brokenness especially after the First World War which destroyed almost 40 million innocent lives.

With no doubt, this is why T.S. Eliot adopted such images of spiritual aridness and emptiness as a key tone of this poem. Likely, we encounter such symbols and images of drought, aridity, emptiness and lifelessness etc. in this poem.

Why is April the cruelest month to Eliot? What sort of the imagery of April is he trying to preach to his contemporaries and the readers to come? Eliot is showing us the devastated emotional and spiritual situation of the modern/post-modern humanity through such a dominantly employed imagery of the barren vegetation, which is about to encounter the newly coming Spring along its rain - the spring rain. April in Eliot's poetic sense and world, is clearly, the very season of new life and new light because in this month of April, The Lord of Resurrection, Christ Jesus is resurrected from the dead.

For Eliot, one big dilemma of the spiritually dried and dead modern human beings is that they are not only tightly clinging to such an empty, sterile and devastated wasteland but also don't even want to wake up from such spiritual hibernation. They rather, love such winter sleep which had been providing their hollow spirits of relaxation, lifelessness and oblivion. They were deeply falling in love with such spiritual oblivion and dark warmth of winter.

Likely, the arrival of Christ's resurrection in April becomes a dreadful agony to them. This April's "New Life" inevitably requires the very ending of their spiritual hibernation in the midst of deep spiritual oblivion. In this poet Eliot's eye, they have been nakedly and still are exposed to such a dreadful sound of bugle call for the New Spring Rain and New Light - New Life in Christ Jesus.

Arise, shine for your light has come and the glory of the Lord has risen upon you. Christ Is Risen Indeed! Alleluia!

We celebrate the good news that in Christ's death and resurrection we, and all creation, are continually being made new by God's love and saving grace.



Tips for instilling faith in children

Helping kids learn about God may seem intimidating. The good news is that a theology degree isn't required and it has less to do with words than with actions. Make faith real in the lives of the kids we love with these tips.

Every day presents teachable moments

When you allow your kids to talk about how they are feeling and how to approach things in a Christ-like way, you're having that sacred moment without naming it. Sitting around the table at mealtime, taking a walk, snuggling at bedtime are ideal holy moments.

Engage all five senses

Asking children what they see, what they smell, what they hear in the world helps them experience God's creation in a variety of ways. Using this tip isn't just for nature walks or outside settings. The same questions can be asked following all activities, including church.

Allow kids to have their own experiences

Leaders suggest we share the Bible stories without editing and introducing personal biases. Let kids ask questions. Asking questions is meant to engage our curiosity. There are no right or wrong answers,

Take time to wonder

The greatest gift our kids give to us is the curiosity they bring to the table.

Build wonder with a spiritual library and create a space for discovery.

Being present is a spiritual act

Showing up, being there and listening to your child is the cornerstone of faith.

Authenticity rules!

Admitting you don't know the answer or that you messed up is OK too. Model what it means to be a believer.

Be a faith storyteller

Children love a good story, particularly when someone they love is the main character. Our faith stories are valuable to children. Being a faith storyteller makes faith come alive and weaves into your family's faith story.

Methodist History: The Founding Mothers of Mother's Day

Ann Reeves Jarvis lived in a coal mining part of what is now West Virginia

She started mothers clubs. And she talked to them about hydration for fevered babies, about sanitation and nutrition. And then the Civil War came along and a field hospital was built nearby.

Ann recruited nurses for military hospitals, and after the war formed friendship clubs to promote reconciliation.

Ann Jarvis was convinced that mothers, women, but especially mothers, had to work for peace because they could see the ravages of war in their husbands and in their sons, in a way that was so focused and so clear that their voices would be powerful.

Ann and John Wanamaker, a retailer in Philadelphia, encouraged Woodrow Wilson to sign the petition.

Ann Jarvis died in 1905, before an official holiday was in place. But her daughter Anna (who was never a mother herself) stayed true to the purpose of the celebration. She imagined Mother's Day as a time to write a personal letter to your mother, a time to send her a carnation (a flower in which the petals hold tight like a mother's love) and a time to visit or attend church together. In May 1908, Anna Jarvis organized the first official Mother's Day celebration at Andrews Methodist Episcopal Church in Grafton, West Virginia. There was also a Mother's Day event in Philadelphia later that same day.

The history of the church is about the wonderful people that make up the church.

Methodist History: First Father's Day at Church

The first Father's Day service in the U.S. was held in Central United Methodist Church in Fairmont, West Virginia on July 5,1908 after a Methodist church member suggested the idea. The congregation found it important to heed the commandment to "honor thy father and thy mother."

The encouragement came from Grace Golden Clayton, the youngest of 11 children born to an ordained Methodist pastor.

In the early 1900's, Clayton lived with her husband and children in the middle of West Virginia coal country, when tragedy struck at a nearby coal mine killing more than 360 men. The tremors were felt in three or four towns...that left over 1000 children without help. Grace Golden Clayton suggested to her minister, Dr. Thomas Webb, that a service be held to honor all those men who had died in the mines, giving Father's Day its first religious celebration.

This says a lot about what Methodists feel about families, probably the most important thing other than God. It really does make it feel like a tightknit family, friends and fellowship church.

In 1972, Father's Day became an official U.S. holiday, to be held on the third Sunday in June.
