Township Celebration

Township UMC celebrated their 200th anniversary of its sanctuary building in July with a service, presentations and picnic. It's history and heritage were honored by present and former pastors, community members, friends and families.

Parishioner and organist Barbara Ackerley graciously shared her opening greeting for the blessed event. . .

"Hello everyone. It's good to see you all here today.

I am the church building and I am 200 years old. I have been blessed to be a place where many have come to worship. It was God's purpose for me and I am thankful that so many faithful Christian have come here to worship or we might be just one of those sad and empty little churches.

This church was started way back in pre-Revolution days. Settlers came from Stamford Connecticut. When the war broke out, they returned to Connecticut and when the war was over they returned to the Township Valley. After being settled, they felt the need for a place of worship.

Prior to this the circuit riders fulfilled their needs. So in 1794 a society was formed. This was the beginning of the Township Methodist Church. It was called First Methodist Church.

On Jan 13, 1823 it was voted to build the church. It was then named Township Methodist Episcopal Church of Stamford. The framed was put up, enclosed, but not furnished. They only had rough benches (the ones you are sitting on now) until 1829. The cost was \$500.00.

Many changes have been made over the years. The pulpit was originally a raised pulpit with steps, so the people upstairs could listen and sing along with the other parishioners. Through the years many improvements and gifts have been donated. The baptismal font, the pulpit Bibles, handwork in the form of the Lord's prayer and probably the most precious is the painting of Jesus walking on the water. The paining was done by Rev. P. St.John Coleman. He was a minister of our church at the time in 1912. Fluorescent lights were donated to light up the paining. A horse block that was by the driveway was moved and is now the landing at the front entrance to the church.

In 1983 the church was raised and a new foundation was installed. Also added were new carpet, electric lights, cushions for the benches, new furnace, new roof, new windows, and new ramp. The bell was put back on the church roof. A new exit door was installed in the back of the the church.

Well, enough about this church building. It's about 200 years of Christians who have come to worship and commune with one another, as we are doing today. They are the ones who have made it a church. The world has changed drastically over 200 years. But there is still one thing that has not changed and that is our Mother Church, the first one in the Township Valley.

There have been 96 minister who have served our church and Pastor Peg will make it 97. The church used to be filled to the brim with Township families, but times have changed. Only a few come to church now, but remember it only take two to make a congregation. It's sad that religion has taken a backseat to our society today. Here's a question to ponder on. . . Do our young people know about Jesus, The Golden Rule, The Ten Commandments, The Lord's Prayer, the 23rd Psalm? All of these are not suggestions, they are tenets to live by and follow. God is our rock and foundation and he is the reason we are 200 years strong. Thank you all for coming to help us celebrate 200 wonderful years."



A Word From Pastor Dawn

A Word from the Heart....With all the changes we have experienced in the Delaware Headwaters charge, I have been doing a lot of meditating on how we can most effectively be the church of Jesus Christ, within these configurations. Roman's ch 12 is very useful for looking at how we function as a "charge" or an individual church. Romans 12:4-6 reads: "A body is made up of many parts, and each of them has its own use. That's how it is with us. There are many of us, but we each are part of the body of Christ, as well as part of one another. God has also given each of us different gifts to us".

As I have met with the Mountain Beacon Parish, and our Charge teams (SPR, Mission and Ministry and Worship), I have seen this at work. Everyone's input has been important. Each person's contribution has led to a greater ability to do God's work. It has been so good to have representatives from the various churches because we have a wider scope of ideas and thoughts. I see this also in our individual churches. In preparing for Charge Conference, people's expertise and abilities help us Peg and I complete our paperwork so much better. I invite you to contemplate this question these next few months. Each of you is an important part of the body, how are you using your gifts to better the church/charge?

Your Missional Apportionments

Ever wondered where your apportionment dollars go? Each newsletter, I will be highlighting some of those programs. Today I want to share a program that could benefit people in our communities.

"Done in a Day" started as a response to Superstorm Sandy. It was a program designed to engage small volunteer teams in the recovery effort by assigning them to locations and projects that were well organized and managed, and with a specific task for a day. The catch phrase was, "Start early, end late-done in a day!" While the Sandy recovery effort continues to go on, we are also looking to transition this ministry, and the many skills and energies of our volunteers to continue their efforts, but on more local levels. "Done in a Day" seeks to work with churches to identify local homes and homeowners who are in need, who may not be able to afford repairs, or who many need some TLC through home repairs. A priority should be given to low-income families, seniors, persons with disabilities, single-parent families, and others with special needs or circumstances. Local churches would provide the volunteer labor for the effort, and the Missions office will assist with funding.

How might we use this program to benefit our communities?



The 2023 VBS program at Bloomville UMC was a great success! Our theme this year was Flight Express, Flying High With Jesus. Children were able to participate in bible lessons, games, singing, crafts, and supper, which all centered around flight.

Bible verses were taught through fun activities during lesson time and children learned how to care for God's many creations and obey his word.

Our mission this year was to collect for the Heart of the Catskills Animal Shelter.

A Charge is a church or group of churches that share a pastor/pastors and have a shared Charge budget for salaries, utilities, compensation, etc. Each church also has its own individual budget. In a charge, there are "charge committees;" i.e. Ad Council, SPR, Worship, Ministry and Mission, etc. Each church can hold its own meetings to discuss business within that church; each church has its own service with the exception of a few shared services; each church has its own Trustees and officers. Because of the limited number of pastors in the Conference, most churches are now part of a charge. We are stronger together!

News from Alain & Katherine Niles

Dear Friends

Interesting fact: half of Togo's population is under 15 years old. This means, our hospital is always full of pediatric patients. We get to love on these little ones and care for them, which is a daunting task.

Last month, while working in the hospital, I was called to go help resuscitate a newborn. The mom, who was pregnant with twins, came and successfully delivered the first one, but began having complications with the second one and was rushed to the OR for an emergency C-section. Our surgeon moved quickly, got the second baby out, and handed me this little boy with no pulse and no respiratory rate. We jumped into action and eventually got a pulse, but the child was not breathing on his own. I spent 15 minutes bagging (breathing for the child) until he finally, slowly began breathing on his own. Several days later after spending time in our NICU on CPAP and receiving great care from our nurses, the baby was discharged with his brother and mother. Several weeks ago the mom followed up with me in clinic with her two healthy boys. What a miracle! And what a testimony to this family of God's love for them and a wide-open door to share about how great God is.

On Sundays we attend a very small gathering in a home with a few believers. We just finished studying the book of James together. Pray for these believers and for our group to grow in depth and in outreach.

In late July we had the privilege of flying to France to go hiking with some dear friends, visit my parents and pop over to the US to attend a very special wedding celebrating Will and Natalie DeKryger. It was a very brief break, but packed full. The kids had a blast with their grandparents while Katherine and I enjoyed a few days alone on our whirlwind trip to the wedding.

We've really enjoyed our summer break, and Caleb has loved having a chameleon as a pet. Next month, school starts up again....Hooray! Katherine has been busy planning and preparing for the upcoming school year. We have new teachers arriving and lots of details to come together. Please pray for the school books to arrive as they are stuck on some shipping container...somewhere.

As we close this letter out, we would ask you to pray for the difficult situation brewing just north of Togo in the country of Niger. There appears to be a lot of instability with the 7th coup in the Sahel region in the last 3 years. These conflicts have allowed for many terrorist groups to develop just north of us. This has also blocked many of our Burkina Faso patients from coming to the hospital. In fact, many of our patients recount treacherous journeys through check points, on back roads around minefields and even having to take planes and helicopters to get to the border to make their appointments. It's heartbreaking to see them suffer. Pray that we might be able to continue offering them quality care and the love of Jesus.

This June the UMW took a trip to Binghamton to the Methodist Children's Home of Binghamton and presented them with a check for \$2,000.
