My dear sisters and brothers in Christ,

"The Word became flesh and lived among us." John 1:14a

According to this belief system, our material world including human body is evil, corrupt and worthless in which our good human spirit is imprisoned. Thus, it was impossible and unthinkable for the true God to take such an evil human body in Jesus Christ. Accordingly, they couldn't believe that Jesus the Christ suffered on the cross. If Jesus was truly divine, then, he could/should not suffer on the cross. For them, God cannot get involved in our daily human sufferings, pains, and problems etc. because God is impassible.

Happy fall!! Sunday School is in full swing and we are having a wonderful time together! I have been so pleased with the weekly attendance so far this year. We have had up to eleven children at a time on Sunday mornings!

We have embarked on our journey to begin figuring out who we are in Christ and what plans God has for our lives.

The first couple of weeks in September we talked a lot about how God feels about us and how He uses us. The children discovered, through scripture, that we are all beloved children of God and that He has made each one of us unique. We also learned that God can use absolutely anyone at any point in their lives, to do His will, and to spread His word!

The children participated in bible stories and discussions about the Apostle Paul and how God intervened in his life, while he was on the road to Damascus. We all learned that even when we make poor decisions and mistakes, God still loves us and wants to use us.

The children recently learned that how God views us is often different than how others sometimes see us. We had a wonderful discussion (and played some fun games, too) that all related to the various negative things that others often say to us. and how our own thoughts and actions can even be hurtful towards ourselves. Through these activities the kids discovered that amidst any negativity, the thoughts of God are nothing but positive, loving, and supportive, and that it is His view of us that we need to focus on. One of our memory verses that we will continue to focus on throughout this year is: "How precious to me are your thoughts, God! How vast is the sum of them! Were I to count them, they would outnumber the grains of sand" (Psalm 139:17-18). I encourage you to ask your

children about the verses that we have learned so far, as the lessons from the scripture are providing us with some great insight into ourselves and how we feel about our lives!

During the next couple of months we will continue to participate in discussions and activities relating to: the various talents and gifts that God has given each of us, gratefulness and how being grateful can drastically change our lives, and of course the birth of Jesus, what that means to us, and how we can be a light for Christ in our lives.

We will be continuing our monthly challenge, which has become a scavenger hunt for scripture, and will also be choosing our holidav giving goal for Heifer International. For those of you who are unfamiliar with this program, it is a nonprofit program that focuses on eliminating hunger and poverty worldwide through providing livestock and agricultural education to impoverished families. A portion of our weekly Sunday School offering will be going to aid in the purchase of livestock that the kids will pick out from the organization's catalog!

As we enter into the holiday season I always start thinking about what I am grateful for and how God blesses our lives every day. I want to take a minute to say thank you for sharing your children with me everv Sunday...their laughter and enthusiasm are infectious and they make me continually remember and appreciate just how special our young people are. I love to see their reactions to the bible stories and discussions of individuals within the bible. It truly amazes me when I can catch the moment that they make the connection between the stories/lessons and how that impacts their own lives.

We are thankful that despite the pandemic, the Physician Assistant program that Alain is in continues without many glitches. Face masks and face shields and some hybrid learning, but overall things are moving forward.

We have enjoyed a beautiful summer as we've settled in Syracuse for this extended time of education in the US. We are not on a regular furlough but a time focused on getting the training needed to help more at the Hospital of Hope in Togo.

We did get a few fun family moments in to enjoy Upstate New York. We tried camping as a family for the first time. It was restful, clean and comfortable....no of course that's a lie! It was mosquitoes, sticky smores, sleeping on hard ground and all of us packed into a little tent. What could be better?

We also enjoyed a great time in Alexandria Bay out on the river with a good family friend and have had many days exploring the myriad of parks in Syracuse.

Overall, we are so thankful for this special place as we plug through an intense medical program and Katherine and the kids take on a new year of Homeschooling.

News of the Hospital of Hope

As usual, the hospital continues to see thousands of patients. Apart from the closed borders, many of the COVID restrictions have been lifted and our colleagues have been putting in long hours to care for our West African friends. Pray for their stamina as short-term relief has been severely limited during the pandemic.

They continue to add new pediatric cancer patients to their growing list of kids receiving chemotherapy at the Hospital of Hope. We continue to pray for healing for these kids and for them to experience the love of Christ at the hospital. Updated info - Unfortunately lightning struck the power line to the hospital compound just recently, blowing the city transformer, damaging the hospital generator and forcing them to rely on a generator. After several days a new small transformer was installed, but the hospital's main generator needs repairs, which mean parts have to come from the States. The lightning hit will cost more than \$15,000 in parts and repairs.
