A Message From Pastor Dawn

A Word from the Heart....

What is the purpose of the church? Is it to meet the member's needs? Is it to do outreach and ministry in the community? Is it to make disciples? I have been reflecting on these questions this summer in preparation for school starting again and meetings ramping up because of Charge Conference. I have outlined below suggestions on how we can "be the church" through these areas.

Meeting member's needs: What are ways in which we check up on each other? What are ways we lift each other in prayer? What are ways we make sure each and every person in the church feels heard? What are ways in which worship helps people grow spiritually? The reason this is important is because church members can't fulfill Jesus' mission if they are running on empty. So here are some opportunities to meet each other's needs:

Begin a Card ministry Begin a Casserole ministry Attend the Prayer meeting Serve on the Worship team Other ideas?

Outreach and ministry in the

community: This does not mean inviting people to church, it means going OUT of the church and ministering to people in the community. Here are some opportunities to do this:

Come to Soup's On Help with the crafts, Soup's On or worship at the Sr. Living Go to the Blessing of the Animals and hang out and talk to people Volunteer at the Thrift Shops Go to Youth sports activities to support them Christmas Feeling Fund Other ideas?

Making disciples: First we have to know what it means to be a disciple, that means doing a Bible Study or reading spiritual books. Second, we have to be willing to go outside our comfort zone and share our faith with someone. Third, it means we have to have activities that we can invite people to come to.

Attend a Bible study

Begin morning devotional practice with prayer and scripture reading. Attend and invite someone to the Prayer Meeting

Take someone to lunch and as you are listening to them, see if there is a way to share how God has helped you this week.

Go on the Prayer Walk Help with the Youth Group/VBS Other ideas?

Please bring this to your Ad Council's and discuss what does it mean to you to "be the church" and see what ideas your church member's might be able to do. Please reflect on this and see how you are "being the church".

Come and try our Prayer Meeting

One of our newest ministries is the monthly Prayer Meeting, presently

meeting at Gilboa. You might ask what a prayer meeting is and why we do it. A Prayer Meeting is like a small worship in that we begin with some quiet music, have a devotion or scripture, then move into Intercessory prayer. No one is asked to pray out loud, simply to lift concerns. It is confidential. We lift a prayer after each category of intercessions. Then we conclude with a benediction. The service lasts about 30-45 minutes. We have been following this with a potluck—breaking bread together like the early Christians. Why do we do this? First, because intercessory prayer and worship are spiritual disciplines that we are called to practice. Second, because we are in a difficult time right now with so much grief, illness, division, violence, negativity and war that need our prayers. The Prayer Meeting helps us lift these prayers, but also immerses us in the peace of prayer. Third, it is an informal time of both worship and fellowship which allows us to get to know each other better. So why not come and give it a try. Our next Prayer Meeting and Potluck is on Wednesday, Sept. 18th at 6p.

Ministry at the Assisted Living Center

Our Charge is involved in a variety of ministries at the Stamford Assisted Living Center on Buntline Dr. and we would love for you to join us in those ministries. This is a wonderful way to serve our seniors in the community. Worship is at 3p on the 1st and 3rd Wednesdays of the month. Crafts are on Sept. 9th and the 23rd at 9:30a. The New Hope Episcopal Area

The 2024 Northeastern Jurisdictional (NEJ) Conference ended with the announcement of six new reconfigured Episcopal Areas and the assigning of bishops to supervise those areas. The new six new episcopal areas are:

- Baltimore-Washington and Peninsula-Delaware
- Eastern Pennsylvania and Greater New Jersey
- New York and New England
- Susquehanna and Upper New York
- Western Pennsylvania
- West Virginia and Holston (a joint arrangement with the Southeastern Jurisdiction)

This newly formed Episcopal Area—the New Hope Episcopal Area encompasses the existing New York Annual Conference and the New England Annual Conference (which includes the remainder of Connecticut, Rhode Island, Massachusetts, Vermont, New Hampshire, and Maine). At the NEJ Conference, the New England and New York delegations decided that the New Hope Episcopal Area describes a sense of hopeful anticipation for mission and ministry in this region of the Northeast.

Bishop Thomas J. Bickerton will continue to serve the New York Annual Conference as our Resident Bishop. He will also serve as bishop for the New England Annual Conference.

Alain & Katherine Niles' Update

Dear Friends,

A young man entered my clinic room and found it difficult to explain his issues. He was agitated, uncomfortable and fearful, almost to the point of being terrified. I quickly realized his issue was less of a medical problem and more of a spiritually rooted problem. I decided to end our consultation and offered to come to his home and talk with him about his fears. He agreed to this. A few days later I headed out on my

motorcycle with our chaplain, Dieu Donné. We had to load the moto into a canoe and cross the Oti River and then drive through farming country to get to Amidou's home. He welcomed us in and we spent over an hour listening to how his anxiety had forced him to turn to a local Muslim traditional healer who placed a ring on his finger and bound him to evil spirits. We shared of the freedom in Jesus and spent time praying for him and for his situation. The next morning, Amidou received word that the traditional healer had died in the night (I should mention I prayed for Amidou to be freed not for this man to die...in case you were wondering). He was due to attend the funeral the next day but came instead to the hospital since we had invited him. He spent hours talking with our chaplains before giving his life to Jesus. As soon as he made the decision, he received a phone call that his mom and brother, who were on their way to the traditional healer's funeral, crashed their moto just outside the funeral site...they never made it to the ceremony. They were quickly brought to the hospital and I was able to check them out and then testify to God's hand in pulling them away from evil towards himself. It was an amazing moment watching this young man and his family literally get drawn to Jesus. Amidou has many challenges ahead, but pray for him to surrender daily to Jesus for the peace he is searching for.

Not every consultation turns into incredible follow up and patients turning to Jesus, but we rejoice even in the mundane visits of caring for diabetes, hypertension, heart failure and all the other diseases that kill you slowly. Being consistent in quality care helps us build relationships, and families in our town have grown to trust our care. In fact, I took care of a child in our malnutrition clinic, then cared for his brother with malaria and finally have been regulating his grandfather's blood pressure. The platform for loving on these entire families is key to our ministry here.

The hospital's 3-year nursing program wrapped up this last month with 15 students graduating. Our hospital has the best nurses in Togo and we are thrilled to add this team to our staff. I played a minor role in helping organize the Bible courses offered throughout the program. The students, many of whom are Muslim or Catholic, were able to study God's Word and hear truth on a daily basis. It culminated with the nursing school graduation on July 6th. The nursing program director, Sharon, did a fantastic job in summarizing their training and challenging them for the future work ahead. I had the privilege of sharing the gospel message to them and their families. I spoke on the fruit of the spirit we desire to see in the lives of our nurses, but explained that this fruit can only come from the Spirit of God in them and that they can only have the Spirit of God in them if they are born again. This was a true contrast from their culture which teaches to do good works in order to be accepted by God. Pray the message of the gospel will continue to take root in their lives.

The MK school year wrapped up in the middle of June, and Katherine and the kids have been enjoying their summer break. Katherine has been putting finishing touches on the spelling program she created for the elementary grades at the MK school this last year. A camp of newly hatched chameleons was discovered and was the source of great joy and amazement. It was truly fascinating to get to see these tiny creatures close-up! A highlight for Caleb has also been getting to work with his friends at the farm behind our hospital (doing odd jobs and helping shepherd the sheep). Knowing that the hospital will be entering the busy malaria season that usually continues through November, we are grateful that we were able to get away for a needed rest and family time. When needing rest, we always gravitate towards the mountains; so, we just wrapped up 10 days in Switzerland and France with lots of incredible hiking, camping at the base of the Yung Frau, hiking up the Grand Van in France, and enjoying the incredible beauty of the Alps and time with Alain's parents. We were able to celebrate our 18th wedding anniversary and both turning 40 this year. God has been so good to us.

What's coming up?

Well, most likely people will keep getting sick and our hospital will stay busy...

I hope to finish building a few more pediatric incubators for our NICU (a design one of our nurses got from Kenya).

Katherine will continue prepping for the fall classes she will be teaching, hosting meals, doing French literacy lessons with a friend, and doing 'summer break activities' with the kids.

Thanks for praying for the Hospital, for our team, for the patients who come through our doors, and for security and peace in our region!
